

Getting to Know Greg Cook

My name is Greg Cook, and yes, I admit it, I am a life long car nut. I was born and raised in Chicago, Mom says I loved cars at age two. Toy cars, then 1/25 scale AMT model cars were the center of my universe. I started tinkering with real cars in 1964, things got more serious in 1966 when I turned 16. After high school I joined the Teamsters and became a union truck driver. I was hauling down some pretty good coin for an 18-19 year old. Then came the letter, yes, Uncle Sam wanted me. A year later I found myself in Vietnam as an Infantry Sergeant. Other than the Agent Orange I made it through the "senior trip" just fine. After that army the hobby got a bit more serious. I bought a 1951 Ford Club Coupe that I did a very nice "street restoration". Many other cars followed. I quit truck driving in 1975 and took a "working manager" position at a three bay full service Shell station in suburban Chicago. The owner was a bit of an idiot, we made good money but I learned a lot about how NOT to run a business. A great education for me!

1977, I'm 27 years old, tired of the Chicago city/suburb routine. Long story, I ended up in Gettysburg PA where I live with my wife Ann. We live in the same house I bought in 1978. We have four children, four grandchildren, and one great grandchild. My wife says we're old, I disagree. Settled into Gettysburg PA I took a job as the service manager at Don Warner Chevrolet-Buick in Gettysburg, 1978/1982. Then I took a job as a line tech at H&H Pontiac in Gettysburg, 1982/1984. Then finally my last job in service management at Gene Latta Ford in Hanover PA.

On January 15, 1988 I reached the point where I just couldn't deal with the retail automotive world any longer. So I quit my job and went home.

By this time the "home hobby shop" had evolved into a pretty well equipped shop. I had restored many cars for myself and had one AACA First Junior-Senior-Preservation behind me. I was working on a 1954 Buick Skylark which ended up being the first restored 1954 Skylark to win an AACA National First Prize (1st Junior). I didn't really have a plan but the word got out that I was working at my home shop. Retail work started rolling in but within a year I was full time into restoration only. The first serious customer restoration was a 1953 Buick Skylark which won an AACA First Junior at Hershey.

Well, the word got out that I was a "BUICK EXPERT", even though I'm actually a Ford guy. That started the parade of '53-59 Buicks and '53-'59 Cadillacs. Over the next 33 years my shop put out a BUNCH of cars! It was just me with one or two dedicated part timers who loved the work. Full service, one stop shopping, all done in house. I really don't know how many cars but every American make from 1949 through 1970 went through the shop except for a Hudson, Nash, and a Kaiser. All GMs, all Fords, all Chryslers, Studebaker, Packard, Rambler, we got most of them!

I went back through my pictures and best I can tell there were 30 AACA First Juniors, most followed with Senior and Preservation. Even got a few AACA Grand Nationals. In 2001 a 1959 Cadillac Biarritz I restored won Best of Show (post war) at the Cadillac Grand National. There were four "victories" at the Meadowbrook Concours d'Elegance (Detroit) with a '59 Caddy Biarritz, a '59 Buick Electra Convertible, a '59 Buick Estate Wagon, and a '66 Chevelle Funny Car CHEVOOM. You can google the last one.

In the mid 70s I was active in dirt track racing, I "quit racing" for a few years but in 1994 I got active in semi-pro drag racing, did okay, but guit in 2012. Racing is fun but it can get expensive.

In 2021 I found myself in the middle of a battle with Agent Orange cancer so I decided to retire. I was 71 and was tired of the daily routine so I closed the shop and retired. Or so I thought. Keeping up with my twelve cars is a part time job in itself and my friend Skip Boyer from Hanover PA has convinced me that I have to help him with his collection of Buicks. So, between that and maintaining my "museum" I find plenty to do. We just did Hershey, those rows are a bit longer than they used to be!

After a couple month hiatus to care for Shelly after her surgery, the Hack garage has reopened. First on my list was to complete my Oldsmobile engine and get the car back on the road before "convertible weather" ended. This project started last December when I hosted a tech session and several of you helped me remove the engine for an overhaul. As so many of our projects go, this turned into a much longer and pricier endeavor than planned. Upon initially installing and running the newly rebuilt engine in April, the rockers rattled so badly I had to pull the engine again to confirm my suspicion of a wiped camshaft. I returned the engine to JB's Machine shop for a professional inspection and diagnosis. They got back to me the following day with good news. The new camshaft and lifters were fine. The rattling was caused by the original pushrods being too short for the new cam. New rods were easily installed without having to tear the engine down again. I reinstalled the engine and took a break to care for Shelly.

I finally got the car running again just in time to drive to Ocean City October 9th for the fall cruise-in. The car performed flawlessly on her maiden voyage following 200 miles of break in. A great time was had with friends cruising down the boardwalk with about 1,000 other cars tossing candy to the spectators.


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SUNSHINE REPORT FROM MARGARET
