Nearly Three Year Restoration On A 1961 Dodge Pioneer 2-Door Hardtop

I wanted to restore a car that was different, something that I couldn't just get parts from a catalogue. This car was very difficult to put back into original condition.

A lot of the fun to me was looking for these hard to find parts for this car from salvage yards, Ebay and car shows. I think that some of the more unfamiliar cars need to be restored.

That being said, I found the car in 2018. I immediately started to take the car apart. I had the engine and transmission rebuilt. I removed the radiator, heater core, carburetor, power steering pump and steering box for rebuild and eventually reinstalled them. The entire interior was removed, the door latches were replaced (hard job), and the seats were redone with SMS material. We also welded in new floor pans to strengthen the flooring.

My son is an electrician and he installed a new wiring harness. We got everything working. Then we installed new factory NOS gauges in the dash to replace the aftermarket under dash gauges that came with the car. I put in lots of hours redoing the steering wheel. My wife helped me put in the carpet, new headliner, some outside trim and Sue provided a second pair of hands when needed.

Since this car does not have a park position in the transmission the only thing that held the car was the drum brake on the rear of the transmission. For more safety to hold the car on a hill we installed a line-lock system to the rear brakes and put the valve under the front seat. The line-lock system holds the car like a parking brake.

On the outside of the car I stripped the car to bare metal. It had six coats of old paint on it. We did the necessary body work, and put on a new right side door skin. The car was primed and then had it professionally painted in the original color of this vehicle, Spring Green.

Some of the inside and outside trim and parts were very hard to find. Most of them were found at El-woods' Salvage Yard in Hagerstown, Leon's Salvage in Virginia, French Lake Auto Salvage in Minnesota and Ebay. From Ebay I purchased stuff from around the world. So many items came from Salvage yards that listing them would take six pages.

The bumpers and many other pieces were re-chromed. Oddly, two of the most difficult items to find for this car were the arm rests and the lettering for the hood and trunk. Lots of hours were spent in reassembling the car.

Funny now, but not at the time, was replacing the wheels. I had to replace all four wheels

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A Revisit To A Couple Favorite Cruise-Ins From Back In The Day

On late Saturday afternoon June 10th I decided to revisit the cruise-in at Marley station Mall sponsored by *Lost In The '50s* car club.

During the time from 2011 to 2017 when I had my 1954 DeSoto Firedome sedan, I attended the Marley Station Mall Cruise-in nearly every Saturday evening weather permitting.

At that time the mall was still a very viable business. The mall's downfall began when Boscov's Department Store closed their doors. I believe it was shortly after this that *Lost In The '50s* made a deal with mall management to use the parking lot that paralleled Ritchie Highway, route 2 for the cruise-in. It was an immediate success.

Every Saturday there would be 300 to 400 cars show up for the cruise-in, they only charged two bucks to get in and if you got there at the right time, you could get a place to park in the shade. This was important because it got hot on that parking lot.

When I arrived at Marley Station Mall I was surprised to see that the cruise-in was not in the large parking lot that it always has been for years. I hadn't heard anything about them not doing the cruise-in anymore so I drove around the mall. This mall is a shadow of its former self. The only two anchor stores still remaining are J. C. Penney's, Macy's and the Horizon movie theater. All the other stores and eateries and shops like that have mostly disappeared. The good news is the mall property was sold in October for 10.5 million dollars to a well-known Mall developer and real estate company in Arizona. They plan an aggressive leasing campaign to refill the mall with vendors. We wish them a lot of success.

I found the parking lot that the cruisein was now utilizing. It was very similar to the other parking lot only a little bit smaller. I found what I expected to find, a lot of modified cars, hot rods and a couple rat rods Sadly, very few original cars. Just as this show was in the past, nearly

I found a 1957 Chevrolet El Camino. Chevrolet didn't really market the El Camino until 1959. They had the Cameo pickup truck and it wasn't until 1957 when Ford introduced the first Ranchero. They made a pickup truck out of a station wagon, with the roof removed. The '57 El Camino seem to be very well done. I have to give the people that own the vehicle and did the work a lot of credit because it's a nice job.



I also attended a Sunday morning Cruise -in, in Burtonsville, Maryland that I used to frequent nearly every Sunday, also weather permitting. because the lug nut holes were ruined by someone trying to loosen the lug nuts with a pneumatic impact wrench, not knowing they were left-hand threads! They were actually tightening and ruining the wheels. The wheels are special with little nubs on the edge of the rim to hold the wheel covers in place. Without the little nubs the wheel covers won't stay on.

We really enjoyed the restoration process and looking for parts and working on this unusual car. Now we enjoy riding in our 1961 Dodge Pioneer hardtop!

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Driving Passion for Excellence

A contingent of Chesapeake Region members journeyed to Gettysburg on Saturday, June 17th to attend the Rolls-Royce and Bentley car show sponsored by the Rolls-Royce Owners' Club.

I think many members like me had lots of questions about Rolls-Royce and Bentley motorcars for a number of reasons. Not the least of which, Who Actually owns Rolls-Royce?

Well, you may find the answer to that question and many others in the story below. So let's get back to the show at Gettysburg.

There were a considerable number of Rolls and Bentleys in the show. I spotted license plates from Maryland and nearby states but also from Illinois, Kansas, Missouri, Ohio, Texas, Indiana and others. Most of the the cars were trailered but a few were driven to Gettysburg from a distance. Driving a Rolls or Bentley anywhere could be a very scary proposition. Why? Because if one breaks down who is going to fix the car?

I talked to one owner and he said very bluntly, 'nobody wants to work on them.' He said parts can be difficult to obtain. This gentleman also told me that there are only three individuals in the country that know how to rebuild a Rolls V8 engine. He did say there was a shop in New England that specializes in repair of most years and models of Rolls and Bentleys.

It is a well known fact that for may years beginning in the late 1950s Rolls-Royce cars were equipped with General Motors Dual-Range Hydramatic transmissions. Another fellow mentioned that in 1960s and early 1970s there were a lot of GM parts including air-conditioning compressors. Parts coming from GM made it a lot easier to acquire parts.

Who Actually Owns Rolls-Royce?

Rolls-Royce Motors was a British luxury car manufacturer, created in 1973 during the de-merger of the Rolls-Royce automotive business from the nationalised Rolls-Royce Limited. It produced luxury cars under the Rolls-Royce and Bentley brands. Vickers acquired the company in 1980 and sold it to Volkswagen in 1998. Bentley Motors is the company's direct successor; however, BMW acquired the rights to the Rolls-Royce trademark for use on automobiles and launched a new Rolls-Royce company shortly afterwards. Rolls-Royce logo and the Spirit of Ecstasy equipped on a Rolls-Royce Corniche III

History

The original Rolls-Royce Limited had been nationalised in 1971 due to the financial collapse of the company, caused in part by the development of the RB211 jet engine. In 1973, the British government sold the Rolls-Royce car business to allow nationalised parent Rolls-Royce (1971) Limited to concentrate on jet engine manufacture.

In 1980, Rolls-Royce Motors was acquired by Vickers.

Sale to Volkswagen

In 1998, Vickers plc decided to sell Rolls-Royce Motors. The leading contender seemed to be BMW, who already supplied internal combustion engines and other components for Rolls-Royce and Bentley cars. Their final offer of £340m was outbid by Volkswagen Group, who offered £430m.

As part of the deal, Volkswagen Group acquired the historic Crewe factory, plus the rights to the "Spirit of Ecstasy" mascot and the shape of the radiator grille. However, the Rolls-Royce brand name and logo were controlled by aero-engine maker Rolls-Royce plc, and not Rolls-Royce Motors. The aero-engine maker decided to license the Rolls-Royce name and logo to BMW and not to Volkswagen, largely because the aero-engine maker had recently shared joint business ventures with BMW. BMW paid £40m to license the Rolls-Royce name and "RR" logo, a deal that many commentators thought was a bargain for possibly the most valuable property in the deal. Volkswagen Group had the rights to the mascot and grille, but lacked rights to the Rolls-Royce name in order to build the cars; likewise, BMW had the name, but lacked rights to the grille and mascot.

The situation was tilted in BMW's favor, as they could withdraw their engine supply with just 12 months notice, which was insufficient time for VW to re-engineer the Rolls-Royce cars to use VW's own engines. Volkswagen claimed that it only really wanted Bentley anyway, as it was the higher volume brand, with Bentley models out-selling the equivalent Rolls-Royce by around two to one.

Loss of Rolls-Royce marque

After negotiations, BMW and Volkswagen Group arrived at a solution. From 1998 to 2002, BMW would continue to supply engines for the cars and would allow Volkswagen use of the Rolls-Royce name and logo. On 1 January 2003, only BMW would be able to name cars "Rolls-Royce", and Volkswagen Group's former Rolls-Royce/Bentley division would build only cars called "Bentley". The last Rolls-Royce from the Crewe factory, the Corniche, ceased production in 2002, at which time the Crewe factory became Bentley Motors Limited, and Rolls-Royce production was relocated to a new entity in Goodwood, England known as Rolls-Royce Motor Cars.

Despite losing control of the Rolls-Royce marque to BMW, the former Rolls-Royce/Bentley subsidiary retains historical Rolls-Royce car assets such as the Crewe factory and L Series V8 engine.--From Wikipedia Free Encyclopedia.

Member Pat Wenderoth, owner of a 1982 Silver Spur agreed that the cars were better with the availability of General Motors parts. He said before the company went bankrupt they did a study as to what automatic transmission would be best for Rolls-Royce. The consensus was that there was no automatic on the market better for Rolls-Royce automobiles than the GM Hydramatic.

This show played right into my wheel house! There were ZERO modified cars, no lead sleds and thankfully no RAT rods! Also, no cars with bright red velour interior or big ugly wheels!

Phil Hack and I took a large number of photos, however, we are short on identifying what year and model they are. Some cars had a sheet on the dashboard explaining the year, make and model. But the text was small and hard to photograph. Rolls-Royce stayed with a particular style for 10 years or more, especially the grille.

Tech Talk is Dedicated to Technical Director, Gary Ruby Emeritus

How many Chesapeake members that have an antique car that came equipped from the factory with a wind up or electric clock can say it still works? I'm not referring to a digital one from the 80's or 90's. Probably very few. Of all the cars I've had from the 40's through the 70's I would say maybe one or two still kept time. Most lasted a couple of years and then quit working.

Having the dash cluster out of my '63 Chevrolet to fix the speedometer, I decided to pull out the dead clock and get it working again. There are a couple of options to choose from when getting a clock fixed: repair the original movement or replace it with a quartz unit. Having put in a quartz replacement years ago on my '63 Pontiac and being totally satisfied, I decided to go quartz. The only noticeable difference once installed will be the sweep of the second hand. A steady spin of the second hand on an original repair compared to a jerky bump on a quartz replacement.

I contacted Instrument Services Inc. (815-316-2921) in Illinois about the repair. For my type of electric clock, the total cost including restoring the face and hands was \$162.00 and it took about eight weeks.

I like everything on my cars to work as originally manufactured so I felt it was worth the cost and the time to get the clock to operate correctly.--*Gary*
